## Briefing Note

## Background

Lancashire Fire and Rescue Service is becoming more and more involved in multi agency working partnerships across Lancashire including attending Multi Agency Public Protection Arrangements (MAPPA) and work with individuals being released back into the community to further help reduce risk to individuals and local communities with regards to fire related issues.

In recent years Lancashire Fire and Rescue Service have received an increase in requests for intervention activities for adult fire setters. However, in England there is currently no nationally recognised intervention scheme and only a small number of other Fire and Rescue Services across the UK offer provision of this type. With this in mind Lancashire Fire and Rescue Service in partnership with Criminal Justice Services and Health Services have produced this Adult Fire Setter Education Intervention partner resource pack which, is intended to support the educational element of any intervention with adult fire setters.

This resource pack should not be viewed as a one size fits all approach – individuals circumstances should always be taken into consideration including any treatment plans so that no one unintentionally interferes with another treatments effectiveness.

## ADULT FIRE SETTERS EDUCATION INTERVENTION SCHEME OF WORK

### AIM

The aim of the programme is to increase the service user's awareness of the dangers and consequences of fire as well as their knowledge of basic fire safety, with the ultimate aim of reducing the risk of harm and re-offending.

### OBJECTIVES

To achieve the above aim the service user will undergo an individual education plan, and those who complete this programme will have had the opportunity to learn:

- The consequences of fire, both in human and financial terms, to the victim, the community, themselves, their families and the Fire Service.
- Burn injuries.
- Common causes of fire in the home
- Basic fire safety.

The above can be delivered in three Separate sessions. However, each session can also be broken down into three smaller sessions

## Session 1.

Explores:

- The fire related activity they were involved with, the events leading up to it and the circumstances following the incident.
- Consequences to self, family, the community, the Fire & other emergency services etc.
- The law and arson

## Session 2.

Explores:

- Understanding the effects of burn injuries both in the short and long term
- The treatment of burn injuries
- The psychological problems caused by burn injuries
- Living with injury and disfigurement

## Session 3.

Explores:

- The danger of smoke and flames
- The speed and development of fire
- The importance of domestic smoke detectors
- The common causes of fire in the home and how to prevent them
- The importance of a home escape plan
